

Making a difference for hungry Americans.

In the United States, more than 43 million people are living at or below the federal poverty level¹, which means that hunger and food insecurity remain persistent problems.

Chances are you know someone who is hungry. Maybe it's your child's babysitter or the mechanic who repairs your car. It might be the janitor at the local school, the young woman who cuts your hair, or that neighbor who keeps to themself.

The fact is, one out of every eight Americans today is struggling (often silently) with hunger. C&S remains committed to the fight against hunger. Each year, we provide substantial support to four of America's most respected and effective hunger relief organizations, with a special focus on child hunger.

Partnering to feed hungry children.

C&S is a Leadership Partner to Feeding America, the nation's largest domestic hunger-relief organization.

In 2017, we provided key support to Feeding America and its national child hunger strategy to:

- Supply 600,000 servings of shelf-stable milk to 24 food banks for distribution to children through BackPack and School Pantry programs.
- Provide materials, training, and technical assistance to food banks across the country to improve and expand BackPack and School Pantry Programs and Kids Cafe sites.

We're committed to providing nutritious food to kids and families in need through Feeding America's network of food banks and the agencies they support such as senior centers, food pantries, day care centers, and soup kitchens. Our donations this year tipped the scales at more than 15 million pounds. More than half of our donations were high demand items: fresh vegetables and fruit, protein, and dairy.

Grant support this year was directed to a dozen food banks across the country to advance their important, day-to-day work to reach children at risk of hunger.

Share Our Strength's No Kid Hungry campaign works to end child hunger by connecting kids to nutritious food, teaching families about healthy, affordable cooking, and investing in community organizations that fight hunger. In 2017, C&S support helped Share Our Strength to:

- Sponsor a national summit for leaders from 35 states on the topic of summer meals for vulnerable children.
- Continue development of the "schools as nutrition hubs" concept in partnership with the School Nutrition Association.
- Reach 150,000 kids by distributing free bookmarks with information about the National Summer Meals text hotline.
- Increase access to school breakfast and summer meals for children in five states where C&S employees live and work.
- Develop the 2017 edition of Hunger in Our Schools, a report and interactive website that highlights the realities of hunger for students in America's public schools.
 C&S has been a sponsor of this report since 2012.

Supporting emerging hunger leaders.

The mission of FoodCorps is to connect kids to healthy food in schools. In partnership with AmeriCorps, FoodCorps places members in high-need schools to give hands-on nutrition lessons, boost healthy cafeteria meals, and encourage a school-wide culture of health. In 2017, C&S support helped to:

- Place 10 FoodCorps members who reached 3,300 students, taught 1,300 lessons, and recruited 200 volunteers.
- Promote healthy eating by providing books and educational materials for students at 350 schools in financially challenged neighborhoods.
- Drive awareness of hunger in schools through the Victory Growers Award competition.

The Congressional Hunger Center (CHC) trains and inspires leaders who work to end hunger. In 2017, C&S supported training for the CHC's 23rd class of Emerson Hunger Fellows. The Fellows focus on domestic hunger issues, including federal nutrition programs critical to children, such as SNAP, the School Lunch Program, Summer Meals Program, and the WIC Program.

Our support also helped educate Fellows on important food security issues and placed them on child hunger and nutrition projects in communities in Washington, DC and across the country.





Pitching in. Inspiring others. Making a difference.

In 2017, C&S employees volunteered their time and shared their skills in service to our communities, making positive impacts all along the way.

In April, during National Volunteer Month, C&S teams worked with nonprofit groups across the country to accomplish more than 30 projects. We cleaned, stocked shelves, and bagged food at nine food banks in Florida, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, California, Texas, Hawaii. and Massachusetts.

Some teams helped with a Habitat for Humanity renovation project and painted at shelters for the homeless. Others collected children's books for a community center and cleared trash from parks and roadways.

And the list goes on! C&S volunteers also planted a garden at an elementary school in California and served lunch at a senior center in Connecticut. We spent time with children with serious medical conditions at a Ronald McDonald House in Florida and helped with a downtown revitalization project in Pennsylvania.

Making Their Mark

In the spring of 2017, C&S sponsored "Make Your Mark on Hunger," a program developed by the youth organization generationOn. More than 32,754 young people in 29 states volunteered 82,000+ hours to hunger-related community service projects. They organized food drives, helped to pack food for backpack programs, and prepared meals at soup kitchens. One group of teens in New Jersey planted a vegetable garden to feed homeless veterans. C&S is proud of all the young volunteers who stepped up to combat hunger in their communities.



Meet Mario, our 2017 Volunteer of the Year.

Mario D'Ambrosio is proof of the saying that "If you want something done, ask a busy person." In 2017, he devoted more than 1,000 hours to the volunteer fire department in his hometown of Matamoras, PA, a community of 2,500 residents. That's in addition to his job as a Selector at the C&S distribution center in Chester, NY.

Although Mario had no previous experience in firefighting, he says "I was up for something new and wanted to help my community.

The department sent me for training and now I'm a firefighter. It's dangerous work, but I like helping people."

Matamoras Fire Chief Thomas Long notes that Mario also volunteered to fill the position of Fire Safety Officer for the department. In this role, he focuses on community outreach and is a popular visitor to local schools, where he educates children about fire safety and prevention. "Kids are never too young to learn how to respect the power of fire and how to keep their homes and families safe," says Mario.

C&S is pleased to recognize Mario's contributions to his community and to our company by naming him Volunteer of the Year.

C&S believes that local giving is an effective way to strengthen communities, which is why giving to the United Way has been part of our culture for decades.

Each year, our associates show their support for the United Way through contributions made during our workplace campaign, and our family of companies provides a dollar-for-dollar match. In 2017, we raised more than \$1.5 million for 82 United Ways across the nation.

Investing in our children.

C&S has a long and proud tradition of supporting organizations and programs that improve kids' lives. Here are just a few examples:

Children's Hospital at Dartmouth and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute

There's absolutely no question. When cancer strikes children, our hearts break and we want to do everything we can.

This year, as in the past, we donated some of the proceeds from the C&S Charity Golf Outing to two organizations whose work with young cancer patients is extraordinary:

- Children's Hospital at Dartmouth (CHaD), in Lebanon, NH, to support the dedicated medical teams in the pediatric oncology unit.
- Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, in Boston, MA, to pursue revolutionary treatments for children based on genomic sequencing.

Edge of Leadership

Given the right encouragement, guidance, and opportunity, students can become a powerful resource for bringing positive change and innovation to their communities. In the Edge of Leadership (EOL), a program of the High Five Adventure Learning Center, students develop creative problem solving and

effective communication skills. They also learn about making healthy choices and how to become strong leaders in school and in their community.

With support from C&S, EOL is now a signature program of the Keene, NH School District.



First Book

First Book is a national nonprofit that transforms the lives of children from low-income families by providing educators and kids with the resources they need to succeed.

This innovative organization supplies everything from new, high-quality books and educational resources, to sports equipment, winter coats, snacks, and more. First Book's network includes classroom teachers; afterschool, summer, and early childhood programs; shelters and health clinics; libraries; community programs; military support programs; and other places that serve children in need.

In 2017, C&S and First Book provided 26,522 new books to young readers in our communities.

Working toward sustainability.

Environmental sustainability is one of our core initiatives. Each year, we strive to improve in key areas such as energy conservation, recycling, sustainable practices, and forest conservation. In 2017, we:

- Reduced our diesel fuel usage by ½ million gallons.
 Our 730 new and upgraded tractors and refrigerated trailers are efficient—engineered with aerodynamics, state-of-the-art engine technologies, and tire pressure inflation systems. All new refrigerated units operate on electric standby with zero emissions.
- Recycled 17,800 tons of cardboard and 4,148 tons of plastic.
- Piloted a system in two distribution centers that reduced the number of batteries needed for our material handling equipment by 17% or 60,000 pounds.
- Introduced a program to reduce customers' food waste by improving inventory levels.



- Partnered with <u>The Conservation Fund</u> (TCF) to protect 250 acres of working forest—approximately the total square footage of the distribution centers owned or leased by C&S. The wood from these forests will help offset the fiber footprint of approximately 20,000 pallets we use to transport products to grocery stores. This year also marked a decade of C&S support to TCF and their Go Zero® carbon sequestration program.
- a successful program of the <u>Student Conservation Fund</u> that trains military veterans in fire prevention and firefighting techniques. Teams are then deployed in national forests, parks, and refuges. Last year, the Veterans Fire Corps responded to wildfires in nine different locations and managed more than 3,000 acres of prescribed burns.

When disaster strikes, C&S responds.


In 2017, the U.S. was hit hard by hurricanes, flooding, and wildfires. More than 700 people died and millions were left homeless or without basic necessities, including water, shelter, food and power. Although the level of destruction was staggering, Americans stepped up to help their neighbors in need.

At C&S, we mobilized our resources as well, responding quickly to provide aid in disaster-ravaged communities through corporate donations, employee giving programs, and direct delivery of vital supplies.



Hurricane Harvey

Through our "We Stand with Texas" campaign, C&S matched all employee donations dollar-for-dollar. Funds raised supported hurricane relief efforts of the <u>American Red Cross</u> and United Way of Greater Houston. We also donated vital supplies to the <u>Houston Food Bank</u>, including food, water, and sanitation supplies. And, because we're a "hands on" company, C&S employees personally handed out six truckloads of bottled water. One employee, with previous training from the National Guard, rappelled from a helicopter to save people who were stranded on rooftops.

In 2017, in addition to making significant corporate and employee cash donations, we dispatched more than 22 truckloads of food, water, personal care, and hygiene items to communities in Texas, Florida, and California.



Keeping little ones dry and fed in the flood

For families with babies, a lack of clean diapers is no small thing. Recognizing that, C&S donated 8,000 pounds of diapers to the <u>Texas Diaper Bank</u>. We also answered an emergency call from the <u>Ronald McDonald House</u>, which was cut off from food supplies by the storm. C&S (and our colleagues at Grocers Supply) were able to get through with much-needed provisions for children, families, and staff.



Hurricane Irma

Hurricane Irma left a path of destruction in Florida, from the Keys and Miami to Naples and points north and east. In anticipation of the storm's arrival, C&S donated pallets of water to the Florida National Guard and first responders who were on the front lines helping people stay safe.

Taking care of our own

To show their support for co-workers whose homes and property were damaged by the storms, associates stepped up and gave generously to our employee assistance fund, "Friends at C&S." Their contributions were matched by the company.

Hurricane Maria

In the aftermath of Hurricane Maria, more than 95% of Puerto Rico's residents were without shelter, power, or water—or all three. It was an unprecedented catastrophe for the island of 3.6 million people. C&S was moved to help, and made donations to the Food Bank of Puerto Rico, <u>United Way of Puerto Rico</u>, and to the <u>Hispanic</u> Federation's UNIDOS Disaster Relief Fund to assist in recovery and rebuilding efforts.

C&S ships out help to Puerto Rico

C&S donated 155,000 pounds of food, water, and other items to the people of Puerto Rico, delivered via container ship to the Food Bank of Puerto Rico.



California Wildfires

Wildfires in California raged for weeks in the summer and fall of 2017, killing 40 people and incinerating more than 213,000 acres and 5,700 homes. The scope of the fires severely taxed the resources and stamina of firefighters, first responders, and disaster volunteers. In response, C&S donated more than 10,000 pounds of snacks and other easy-to-eat foods to the American Red Cross for distribution to families in shelters, disaster workers, first responders, and volunteers.

Beyond our Borders

For C&S, fighting hunger has always been the cornerstone of our giving efforts. And while hunger remains a challenge here in the U.S., famine continues to ravage many nations and is claiming the lives of hundreds of children each day. In 2017, we contributed to the World Food Programme to help feed babies and children in South Sudan and other regions affected by famine.

<u>Clean the World Foundation</u> Orlando, FL

What if we took all the barely used soaps from hotels and collected them for people in need? We'd not only prevent landfill waste, we'd also slow the spread of disease around the world caused by lack of access to hygiene supplies.

C&S awarded a Mini Grant to the Soap in Schools program, which provides free personal care kits to families.



Free Medical Clinic of DuBois DuBois, PA

At this community clinic, doctors, nurses, and other healthcare professionals volunteer their time to provide free health care and medicine to uninsured people "with dignity and confidentiality." A Mini Grant from C&S will help keep the clinic's doors open to everyone in need.



Wallkill Boys & Girls Club

Improving the nutrition of children is important, so when the Wallkill Boys & Girls Club approached C&S for assistance to purchase fresh fruit and vegetables as snacks in its afterschool programs, we stepped up with a Mini Grant.

Preservation of Life

Houston, TX

Serving hot, nutritious dinners to children in need is vital to the mission of Preservation of Life. With a Mini Grant from C&S, the group purchased a food warmer to be kept onsite at a low-income apartment complex in North Houston. Meals are dropped off five days a week and are kept hot until children get off the bus from school.



Meals on Wheels

Honolulu, HI

The aloha spirit of hospitality finds its highest expression in the services of Hawai'i Meals on Wheels—delivering hot, nutritious meals to seniors and individuals with disabilities. A C&S Mini Grant will help keep the table set for Meals on Wheels clients.





Children's Home of Stockton Stockton, CA

The Children's Home of Stockton is a residential center providing specialized treatment, education, and enrichment services for emotionally disturbed children. In 2017, the Home approached C&S for support for their music program. Students have the opportunity to participate in a class to learn how to build, maintain, and repair instruments. Our Mini Grant will defray the cost of purchasing supplies for the refabrication class.



<u>Surry Volunteer Fire Department</u> Surry, NH

When a 19-year old firefighter in New York died wearing an unfamiliar, poorly fitted face mask, an all-volunteer fire department in a small town near our corporate headquarters vowed to provide all of its members with individual safety equipment. C&S was proud to contribute towards a campaign to purchase protective face masks for the department.



Fly Movement

Fly Movement provides fitness trackers for economically disadvantaged kids. The program encourages children to reach fitness goals through fun, rewarding team competitions. With diabetes and obesity on the rise, C&S is happy to assist Fly Movement in getting kids moving!
